Overview

The COVID-19 crisis has left millions of Americans without work. As workers struggle to adapt, millions will be looking to reskill and change jobs and careers. Through the Strada Public Viewpoint survey, we are getting some early signals about the fields that have been most affected as well as *who* is looking to reskill and *how* they want education and training to be delivered.

- A weekly survey of 1,000 American adults that is representative of the population on the basis of:
 - Age
 - Sex
 - Race/ethnicity
 - Nine geographic census regions
- 6,000+ responses from March 25 to April 30 combined for group comparisons



COVID-19 Work and Education Survey

While 83 percent of Americans believe the coronavirus is a real threat, at this point in the pandemic their most widespread worries are about finances and jobs over their personal health.

Those were among the findings in the second week of a nationally representative survey* of 1,000 people that is designed to track the impact of the pandemic on Americans' lives, work, and education. Results are released weekly to provide insights to the education providers, policymakers, employers, and individual Americans who are navigating the crisis.

Job Field Descriptions


	Job Field	Subcategories/Example Jobs
1	Information technology	Tech support, computer programmers, telecommunications workers
2	Manufacturing	Assemblers, machinists
3	Finance	Accountants, loan officers, tellers
4	Education	Teachers, college faculty, K-12 and higher education administrators
5	Health care	Nurses, doctors, allied health
6	Transportation/utilities	Truck drivers, electrical powerline installers/repairers
7	Retail	Retail workers, cashiers
8	Construction/extraction	Construction workers, skilled trades, agriculture, mining
9	Government	Public servants, defense, aerospace
10	Leisure/hospitality	Restaurants, food, hotel workers, sports, airlines and travel, casinos
11	Business	Human resources, consulting and business services, insurance, real estate, communication, organization, sales
12	Personal care/services	Barbers, childcare, fitness trainers, skincare



Work Impact and Worry


73% of **leisure/hospitality workers** say they have lost work or income as a result of COVID-19

51% of **information technology workers** say they are worried about losing their jobs as a result of COVID-19, compared to only 25% of **education workers**

How worried are you that you may lose your job as a result of the coronavirus (COVID-19) events?




Share of workers (very/extremely worried)



66% of education workers believe COVID-19 will affect them personally for at least six months, compared to only 40% of information technology workers



Work Transitions and Reskilling

36% of workers would look for a job in a different field if they lost their jobs, including nearly half of workers in **manufacturing**, **finance**, and **information technology**


If I were to lose my job because of the coronavirus (COVID-19) events, I would look for a job in a career field that is different from what I currently do.





Information technology and **finance workers** are the most likely to say they would need more education to replace a lost job

If I were to lose my job because of the coronavirus (COVID-19) events, I will need additional education or training to find another job with the same wages or income.




Share of workers (agree/strongly agree)



Only 46% of **personal care/services workers** are confident they know the skills they need to get the job they want

Information technology workers are looking to reskill and are confident they know which skills they need






Education Preferences

If you were to enroll in additional education or training sometime within the next six months, what would be your goal?





Summary and Implications

Work impact, education expectations, and job fields

The range of differences across job fields suggests the importance of going beyond one-size-fits-all solutions. By combining the three key work impact variables and then the three key education expectation variables, we can see these job field patterns more clearly.

Work Impact Index


- Lost job or reduced work hours or income from work
- Worried about losing job
- Predicted length of personal impact

Education Expectation Index

- Interest in changing job fields
- Interest in additional education
- Confidence in understanding of which skills



Workers in **leisure/hospitality** and **personal care/services** have experienced significant work impact from COVID-19 but are less likely to reskill or upskill



Implications

- 1. While they have experienced high impact from the COVID-19 economic crisis, leisure/hospitality workers may be more difficult for educators and workforce developers to reach because of their low interest in reskilling or upskilling.
- 2. Despite experiencing a moderate impact from the COVID-19 economic crisis, among all job fields **personal care/services workers** have the lowest interest in further education and training.
- 3. **Information technology** and **finance workers** provide a unique opportunity for educators: They have a keen interest in further education and training—both to change careers and to upskill within their fields.
- 4. Compared to workers in other job fields, **government** and **business** workers both have been less affected financially and have relatively low interest in further education or training.



Key Findings: Work Impact and Education Perspectives by Job Field

- 1. **Leisure and hospitality workers** have experienced the greatest impact from the COVID-19 economic crisis as measured by job loss and reduced hours or income.
- 2. **Information technology workers** are the most worried about losing their jobs but also the most likely to believe the impact will be short-term.
- 3. **Education workers** are the most likely to believe the crisis will affect them in the long term.
- 4. Nearly half of workers in **manufacturing**, **finance**, and **information technology** say they would change fields if they lost their jobs.
- 5. Workers **across job fields** say they prefer **nondegree** and **skill-based** education and training programs that are delivered **online**.





Methodology

- Weekly tracking of education consumers' perceptions of COVID-19's impact on postsecondary education and work in the
 United States, completed by Heart+Mind Strategies on behalf of Strada Center for Consumer Insights
- Online survey of Americans ages 18 and above
- Representative of the general population in age, gender, geographic region, and race/ethnicity
- Current report for survey results from March 25–April 30: n = 6,027
- A theoretical margin of error based on a probability sample of size 1,000 would be +/- 3.1% at 95% confidence. This is not a probability-based sample, and a margin of error cannot be estimated. Based on experience, we believe the sampling error would be at least this number.

Sample Size by Job Field






Americans' worries about their jobs, finances, mental and physical health stayed steady


What effect do you think the coronavirus outbreak will have on each of the following parts of your life?
